Interesting and exciting programs are planned for every Sunday featuring Dr. Carol Williams, our Civic Organist, and an array of guest organists. Watch our website for weekly updates.

Our 2011 Membership Campaign is now underway. This is what funds our mission to preserve, program, and promote our great Spreckels Organ. It includes funding the weekly organ educational programs for fifth graders, scholarships for promising young organ students, supplementing our Civic Organist's salary, providing for our administrator to keep our office and programs functioning well, and much more.



Our membership for 2010 almost reached 1,000 active members. Due to the current economic recession, however, total gifts were down from previous years.

With a 40% reduction in funding for SOS from the city TOT arts funding, we face another challenging year. We are grateful that many of you have been able to increase your membership levels to help us "weather the storm" during these difficult economic times. Every gift, in any amount, is important to us.

Five valued trustees have just completed their six-year terms of service. They are Julie Hudson, Randy Grabowski, the late Dr. Leroy Phelps, Linda Canon who is continuing to coordinate our volunteers, and Ross Porter, who recently was appointed to be our new Executive Administrator. We very much appreciate all they have done to advance the work of our society, and to serve our San Diego music community.

We welcome two new and returning trustees to our board: They are Jack Lasher and Dr. Richard Griswold, D.D.S. Further information about them is found elsewhere in this issue. I look forward to working with them in the years ahead.

An exciting list of artists for the 2011 International Summer Organ Festival is elsewhere in this newsletter. Already we are receiving sponsorship gifts for individual concerts. Total concert sponsorship is \$7,000 with co-sponsorships beginning at \$500. Gifts in memory of a loved one can also be made. This will be another great summer, indeed.

An award-winning musician beginning in his childhood home of El Centro, Jack has played a central role in San Diego's chapter of the American Guild of Organists and other local arts organizations. With a bachelor's degree from University of Redlands and a master's from Claremont Graduate University, he has served on the City of San Diego's Commission for Arts and Culture review panels and conducted choirs, overseen musical performances, and taught at the post-secondary level. Jack is currently the organist at the Seventh Church of Christ, Scientist in Pacific Beach and offers instruction in voice and music.

Attention Organ Students: Scholarship Auditions

Thanks to several generous bequests a number of years ago, the San Diego chapter of the American Guild of Organists (AGO) is able to fund a number of organ study scholarships. In cooperation with the Spreckels Organ Society, auditions are held annually and are open to organ students of any age, as well as to piano students interested in auditioning to receive an introductory set of organ lessons. This year's scholarship auditions are set for May 14 at First Unitarian Church in San Diego. For repertoire guidelines, rules, and an applications, please go to www.agosd.org/education.htm.

All students who play well in the auditions receive scholarships for organ study. The Spreckels Organ Society recognizes the top performers with additional scholarship funds and the opportunity to play before a large audience. This year's outstanding students will play at the Sunday afternoon concert on June 5.

The organ-specific scholarship program is unique in the United States because of the large number of tuition grants awarded each year. Students who have received scholarships for organ study have gone on to become church organists, concert artists, organ professors, and great fans of the King of Instruments!

AGO aims to "encourage every student from the earliest level of keyboard study to play the organ" and has established a "progression of repertoire and skill development which takes students from the beginning level to the standard literature". Students participating in successive years demonstrate growing skills and musical development. More than 30 students are currently studying organ in San Diego. For the AGO scholarships, at least 20 students usually audition.

Three students who graduated from high school in 2009 after receiving scholarships multiple times are now in college are majoring in organ. A 2007 graduate, who also received multiple scholarships, has a double major in organ and biology.

One scholarship recipient in 2010 filled an unusual break in one of the Monday evening Summer Organ Festival programs. Power concerns caused a break in the programming, and she volunteered to play one of her audition selections, which was received with a spontaneous standing ovation from the audience!

Chelsea Chen, who received scholarships in 1999, 2000, and 2001, went on to receive her B.M. and M.M. from the Juilliard School, was a awarded a Fulbright and completed the Artist Diploma at Yale University. She is now an international concert organist with Karen McFarlane Artists, Inc. ■

New Console Update

The new console was inaugurated at the Sunday concert on January 2, 2011 that celebrated the ninety-fifth anniversary of the great Spreckels Outdoor Organ.

One of the new features of the console is the fact that it is mounted on a unique "hover-craft" platform. A small blower inside the console supplies air pressure that allows the console to glide around the surface of the stage on a cushion of air. The platform has the added benefit that allows the bench to remain in position during the move.

The Console Committee spent time to carefully develop a master plan for possible additions to the organ. Two additional stop terraces were added on either side of the keyboards to accommodate twenty new stops or features. It was the desire of the Committee that the new stops would blend seamlessly into the original symphonic concepts of the Spreckels Organ.

Visiting artists have often commented on the great versatility of our instrument and the planned additions will yet again expand its versatility.

As you look at the console you will see the new blank stopkeys. But if you look even closer, you will notice that they are not blank but are actually engraved with the proposed stop name except the engraving has not yet been inked-in. These indicate the master planned additions to the organ. Among these you will find.....

- ► Centennial Tuba to provide a sonorous crown to the organ.
- ➤ Geigen Celeste and 4' Violina Celeste to enrich the Choir Organ
- Solo Vox Humana to provide contrast to our existing diminutive Vox Humana
- Crommorne to provide another distinctive solo voice
- ► Gamba and Celeste to introduce string texture to the Great Organ
- ► A Persian Roll Cymbal to compliment the existing Crash Cymbal
- Xylophone and Glockenspiel (Yes, Bach had a Glockenspiel on his organ)
- ► Toy Counter and Sound effects to accompany silent movies

Each of these additions will add distinctive new colors and voices to the organ. If you have an interest in making these dreams come true, please contact President Ron De Fields or Curators Lyle Blackinton or Dale Sorenson for further information.

PRESERVING A LEGACY

Since the last major renovation of the Spreckels Organ Pavilion in the 1980s, the non-profit Spreckels Organ Society has been a partner with the City of San Diego in programming and promoting the great Spreckels Organ in Balboa Park. One of the mainstays of this partnership has been the City's commitment to fund the San Diego Civic Organist position since 1926. Dr. Carol Williams, the seventh person to hold this post, was hired by the City after an international search and has performed with distinction since Oct 21, 2001. The support in our partnership with the San Diego Park and Recreation Department has been outstanding

RENEWAL OF CIVIC ORGANIST'S CONTRACT

In recent weeks, as the Organist's current contract was coming to expiration, a renewal was negotiated. When this proposed contract renewal was placed before your City Council committee on Culture and Natural Resources, you questioned whether support should come from the Park and Recreation department or another agency, while re-stating the value of the city's support for organ concerts in the park.

A VIBRANT PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP

The public depends on the City of San Diego to fund the post of Civic Organist. The City's direct payment of approximately \$29,000 per year is augmented by a second post of Artistic Director for the Spreckels Organ Society, resulting in professional-level pay and health benefits. It is vital that this public-private partnership be continued, regardless of which entity at the City is charged with this expense.

The Spreckels Organ Society is a strong private-non-profit partner in the fulfillment of the original Deed of Gift to program the Spreckels Organ and Pavilion for the "free use, benefit, and enjoyment of the people." Private funds and the volunteer work of the Society more than match the City's outlays to program and promote the Spreckels Organ. The Society can do no more financially than it already is doing.

A BELOVED CIVIC TREASURE

More than 100,000 people each year enjoy the free organ concerts, and thousands of them make freewill donations to make sure they continue. Almost 1,000 San Diegans are current members of the Spreckels Organ Society and thousands of people worldwide over the years have made donations to support this cultural treasure. In January a new state-of-the-art console, purchased with gifts from Las Patronas and the Legler Benbough

Foundation, was given to the City to ready the Spreckels Organ for its second century. These donors fully expect there to be a Civic Organist to expertly utilize this \$150,000 gift. Plans are already underway for special programming during the Society's 25th Anniversary in 2012 and the Centennial of the organ in 2015.

CALL TO ACTION

The Spreckels Organ Society urges The City of San Diego to promptly renew its commitment to maintaining the post of Civic Organist so that the great and historic Spreckels Organ plays for the future enjoyment of all.
