# DR. KENNETH HANSON FORMER PRESIDENT, SOS

Ken Hanson, born and raised in Honolulu, began a "hands on" in organ playing and building as a teen ager. The family church was involved in a building project; a member donated an Austin organ. Ken, a piano student, was interested in the process. The number of crates and boxes intrigued him further. Walking home from school, he would stop to see the installation. Quite soon, Ken became a "gofer" for the installation specialist even crawling into the wind chamber to hand tools. Ken remembers the bib overalls worn by the specialist, only later learned he was one of the brothers of the Schoenstein Organ Company of SF

When the donor of the organ was aware of Ken's interest and involvement, she sent a letter of appreciation and included a check. Ken used the check to pay for organ lessons. As a senior in high school, Ken played in the Sunday School, even receiving pay.

After Ken, who did his undergraduate and post grad studies at the University of California at Berkeley, established his medical practice in San Diego, his interest in organ building continued. Ken guided each of the five children with tasks to assemble an organ from a purchased kit. That instrument remained in the home until recently. During the building process, Ken visited the Blackinton Organ Company. The active interst in music continues now as Ken joins with others. A group, called The Four Seasons, with some connection with Grossmont Hospital meets to play four times a year.

A member of SOS since '93, Ken has served as a Trustee in '05 became a member of the finance and nominating committees. During that Board service, he supported a revision of the by-laws to define the terms for trustees. Nominated again to the Board, he was encouraged to be vice president, then, abruptly found he became president. The Grant committee became an addition to the Board structure during his presidency.

Interest and support of SOS continues; music is a hobby that will last a lifetime. Often, Ken serves as a greeter and seeks funds. He approached the Norris Foundation to gain partial support for two the the artists in SOF '09. Organ music has appeal to many people. The Spreckels Organ is versatile and unique with the ability to present a variety of music with the skills of many artists.

Among the many museums and organizations in Balboa Park, SOS is one of the younger organizations but has a great presence as location and wide offerings for people of all ages. Ken names the educational aspects as very important and encourages further development of such programs.

# HOW DOES THE SPRECKELS ORGAN COMPARE

We can proudly say the Spreckels Organ is the World's Largest Outdoor Organ but we recognize that there are many larger indoor organs. Some notable instruments, listed in order of size, are as follows:

Saint Matthew's Lutheran Church, Hanover, PA 4 Manuals 231 ranks 14,341 pipes


